
Herbert, my grandfather, was born on 5th February, 1897 and was registered in the Births, Marriages and Deaths as **Bertie** (Jan-Mar 1897 Axminster 6b 5) in Wilhay Lane in Axminster RD, Devon. His parents were **Henry Charles Willey Gribble** and **Eliza Jane Gribble** née **Larkworthy**.



He was the fifth of five children. His eldest brother, Percy Henry was born in the last quarter of 1888 (Axminster 5b 5), but registered as Larkworthy (his mother's maiden name) although he was always known as Gribble after Henry and Eliza married on 11th February, 1889. His second brother, George Nathaniel Willy Gribble was born in 1890 (registered Oct-Dec 1890 Axminster 5b 4) and his sister, Jane (sometimes called Jennie), on 30th June 1892 (birthdate on Women's Army Auxiliary Corps Index 1917-1920 states birth date as 30/6/1893, but registered July-Sept 1892 Axminster 5b 4). There appears to have been another baby, Frank, born between July and September 1895, registered in Axminster area 5b 3. Grandpa had no knowledge of this brother, whose death was registered in Jan-Mar 1897 (Axminster 5b 3), aged 1 year.



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The first census in which **Bertie** appears is the census of 1901, this time as **Albert**. The family were still in Willhay Lane, Axminster and consists **Henry**, **Eliza** and their children **George** (10), **Jane** (8) and **Albert** (4). **Percy Henry** has obviously left home at this time. One of this row of cottages, Albert Terrace, may have been the home of the **Gribble** family. From old maps there were not many houses at that time in Wilhay Lane, but this row was built in 1889, the year Henry and Jane were married.

Amongst **Herbert's** belongings was this photo below of Axminster C.C. school, now part of Axe Valley Academy in Chard Street (although when it was built it was in Paradise Row), taken in 1931, so presumably he attended here at some point. Enquiries on a local website have ascertained that this building still exists as part of the Axe Valley Academy. I cannot see it from any of the surrounding roads, so cannot check it out.



Unfortunately **Bertie's** mother died between October and Dec 1901 (registered 5b 3) and it appears that the family were farmed out to various relatives.

Grandpa (**Herbert**) said he was orphaned at 5, but the only registered death for **Henry Gribble** is in the last quarter of 1907, aged 55, which would make **Henry** four years older than his birth certificate.

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My father says **Herbert** lived for some time with his uncle **William James Gribble** at Harcombe, but by the 1911 census he is boarding in Colyton, Devon, with the Turl family and is a Scholar, aged 13.

There may be some idea that **Herbert** was apprenticed to a butcher in Colyton, but didn't like it.

Bertie first became known as **Herbert Victor** on his joint Baptism and Confirmation certificate, aged 15. It is interesting that this is at St Mary's in Axminster, so he is back in Axminster by this time. In any case he enlisted in the army at Exeter on 4th December, 1814, officially at 18, but actually only 17 the previous February. His army number was 201499 and he was a Private in the 1/4 Devonshire Regiment.

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He was on service at home from 4/12/14 - 11/12/14. There is no destination listed on his discharge form for the period 11/12/14 - 3/10/16, but I think he was in India, as there are many places in which he was stationed on one side of his army wallet, which is in my possession. From 3/10/16 - 25/2/17 he was in I.E.F "D", which I believe was service in Mesopotamia, with places also listed on the Wallet. He was wounded in Kut-al-Amara in

Mesopotamia and was then shipped back to India and eventually back to England. A letter received from his brother, **George**, was postmarked 13th April and directed to 34th Welsh Hospital, Deolali, Bombay. His son, says he had a large soup plate like hole in his ribs and I know that his last three fingers on his left hand were permanently curled down and unusable, as a result of his wounds.

He was then on home service from 25/4/18 - 19/9/18, mostly, I believe, in Hospital in Tewkesbury.**Herbert** was awarded his War Badge on 11th September 1918, no. 2327.






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He was discharged from Tewkesbury on 19/9/18, to go to his home address of c/o Mrs **Sansom**, North Street, Axminster, just down the road from where he was born. This picture shows Part of Old North Street. Today North Street is a new road, bypassing this part - you can see why!

Herbert was awarded two medals ref. Medal Index Cards Transcription: Service No: 3522/201499





Herbert was honourably discharged on 19/09/191.




There is a blank as to Herbert's movements after being demobbed. These two photos, though, are probably taken in this period. The one on the left is inscribed on the back "To **Carrie**", so is probably somewhere between 1918 and 1922, as he has already met his future wife. Grandma told me they were introduced by a mutual friend, **Alf Henley**.

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However, by 1922 he was living at 80, Woodlands Road, Tyndall Park in Bristol when he was married to **Caroline Lily Paull** at the Parish Church of St Michael's in Bristol on 22nd April of that year.

The church's full name was St. Michael the Archangel on the Mount Without! The witnesses were **Ethel B. Radcliffe** and **Lizzie Harris Paull.** His occupation is stated as a Clerk, probably in the Civil Service as that is where he spent most of his working life. Out of interest, we can notice that he has reverted to

his proper age now out of the army!

By July 1925, they moved to 18, Alexandra Road, Redlands, Bristol, as this photo has the accompanying inscription on the reverse.


Alexandra Road is shown on the map above marked "A".



In due course **Herbert** and **Caroline** produced a son. **Herbert's** Occupation on the Birth Certificate is stated to be Civil Servant Inland Revenue Income Tax Department. By this time they were living at Drove Cottage, Winscombe, Somerset.

At some time, obviously by May 1929, the family moved to Withy Cottage, Lympsham, Somerset and they remained there until the Spring of 1932. Whilst here **Herbert** played for the local Cricket Team.











At some point **Herbert** was well off enough to invest in this car. Unfortunately this is one photo which has no inscription. Weston Taxes Cricket Team taken 7th July, 1931. **HVG** is third from left on front row.



The next move for the family was to 11, Westbrook Road, Weston-Super-Mare, Somerset - a brand new semi detached house, bought for £650! Here they remained for many years.

During the Second World War, **Herbert** became a member of the local Home Guard, as the picture, taken at Westbrook Road, shows.




Caroline at Westbrook Road, Weston-Super-Mare





In August 1944, **Herbert** transferred to Chippenham, Wiltshire with promotion to Higher Tax Officer. The family moved to 29, Birch Grove, Chippenham, another semi and **Herbert** and **Caroline** stayed there for 12¹/₂ years.




In February 1957, **Herbert** reached his sixtieth birthday and under Civil Service rules, was able to opt for retirement, which he did. **Herbert** and **Caroline** moved back to Weston -Super-Mare, Somerset. The bungalow they chose was at 35, Corondale Road. Grandpa took up Bowls and was a frequent player at the Bowling Green in Clarence Park, just behind the seafront. He was also a keen stamp collector.

At some time later, maybe about 1960, they made the move up the hill a bit to 66, Farm Road, a slightly bigger bungalow, which my sister and I really liked because it was very near to Ashcombe Park. Grandma and Grandpa always had two stone rabbits in their

garden, which were called Mutt and Jeff. I also enjoyed using their tea trolley, which had a flap on either side, as a mini office, complete with Grandpa's portable typewriter.

Some time later, maybe the 70s, another move was made to 35 Seabrook Road, very close to their original abode in Westbrook Road.



Herbert enjoyed his retirement, playing bowls, walking and cycling, laterally on a small wheeled Dawes bike, well into his 70s. Life continued peacefully until, in 1977, **Herbert** was unfortunate enough to have to have his left leg amputated due to gangrene. Sadly, the stump never healed well enough to allow him to walk with an artificial leg and he spent the next eighteen months in a wheelchair. In 1978 the other leg also became gangrenous, but he resisted another amputation and died in his sleep on the 24th August



at Weston -Super - Mare General Hospital, aged 81½ years. His ashes were interred in Kewstoke cemetery.
